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I. Introduction and Synopsis

The Indian Council for Cultural Relations was formally set up in 1950, with the primary objective of establishing, reviving and strengthening cultural relations and mutual understanding between India and other countries. **Its aims, as enunciated in the Memorandum of Association, are:**

- To participate in the formulation and implementation of policies and programmes relating to India's cultural relations with other countries;
- To foster and strengthen cultural relations and mutual understanding between India and other countries;
- To establish and develop relations with national and international organizations in the field of culture.

The Council has worked steadily to attain these objectives.

The major activities of the Council include:

- Administration of scholarship schemes for overseas students on behalf of the Government of India, other agencies and welfare of international students;
- ☆ Grant of scholarships to foreign students to learn Indian dance & music;
- ☆ Exchange of exhibitions;
- ☆ Organization of and participation in international seminars and symposia;
- ☆ Participation in major cultural festivals abroad;
- ☆ Organization of 'Festivals of India' abroad;
- ☆ Exchange of groups of performing artistes;
- Organization of lecture-demonstrations by performing artistes abroad;
- The Distinguished Visitors Programme, under which eminent personalities from abroad are invited to India and experts from home are sent abroad to deliver lectures on issues of mutual interest;

- Establish and maintain Chairs for Indian Studies abroad;
- ☆ Presentation of books, audio-visual material, art objects and musical instruments at institutions abroad;
- Provide the Secretariat for the Jawaharlal Nehru Award for International Understanding;
- Organization of the annual Maulana Azad Memorial Lecture and the Maulana Azad Essay Competition;
- Publication of books and journals for distribution in India and abroad;
- Maintenance of Indian Cultural Centres abroad;
- ☆ Maintenance of a well-stocked library and the manuscripts of Maulana Abul Kalam Azad;
- Digitization of rare manuscripts;
- ☆ Awarding of Library Fellowships, and;
- Undertake projects on behalf of the Ministry of External Affairs.

The Council activities are decided and approved by its Governing Body.

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The Council received Rs. 5,750 Lakhs as Grant-in-Aid from the Ministry of External Affairs for the year 2004-2005.

II. Highlights of the Year 2004-2005

Fusion Concerts

Fusion Concerts were organized in India to commemorate the cultural dialogue between ancient world civilizations. Mr. Georges Kazazian from Egypt and Pandit Shiv Kumar Sharma performed at Srinagar, Delhi and Mumbai from 6 to15 June, 2004.

Setting up of A Museum of Traditional Asian Textiles in Siem Reap, Cambodia

The Prime Minister, during his visit to Cambodia in April 2002, mooted the idea to showcase the rich variety of traditional Asian textiles and revival of its skill, which is fast disappearing. Under the Mekong Ganga Cooperation, it was decided to set up a Museum of Traditional Asian Textiles in Siem Reap, which would provide training, workshops with fashion designers and fashion houses, etc. to access international markets. The PM had announced a grant of US \$ 1 million for the implementation of this project. The Government of Cambodia also allotted one hectare of land at a prime location in Siem Reap for the same. The PMO and MEA designated ICCR as the nodal agency for implementation of this project. The Government of Cambodia has designated the 'Authority for the Protection and Management of Angkor and Region in Siem Reap' (APSARA) as its nodal agency.

ICCR and APSARA have signed an MOU and Agreed Minutes to implement this project. The MOU provides for its implementation in three phases: the main museum; workshop and training; and fashion design centre.

Administration

A new Regional Office of the Council has started functioning in Jaipur from April 2004. The office has been housed in the Jawahar Kala Kendra premises.

Scholarships

Thirty Air tickets to scholars from Central Asian Countries:

As approved in October 2003, 6 airfares each to scholars from Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan and Turkmenistan were provided under GCSS during 2004-05 academic year.

The rates of stipend, HRA and annual contingent grants for foreign students were increased by 20 % w.e.f. September 2004 to facilitate the living conditions of our scholars.

The Council has done away with the system of producing House Rent receipts, as the scholars living in private accommodations faced difficulties in obtaining these from their landlords.

Financial assistance has been granted to the following Indian Missions for publication of books:

- e) Embassy of India, Ulaanbatar (Mongolia) for the book *India and Mongolia: Antiquity to Modern Times* and the revised edition of *Ganga River* by Mr. B. Jargalasaikhan, former Mongolian Ambassador to India.

III. Council's Activities

i) Scholarships and Welfare of International Students

One of the important activities of the ICCR is the implementation of scholarship schemes for overseas students for doctoral, post-graduate, undergraduate courses as well as professional courses such as engineering, pharmacy and accountancy. The special focus of the scholarship programme is towards countries in the immediate and proximate neighbourhood.

During the year the Council offered 1,186 scholarships. Out of these, 764 were utilized.

The following scholarship schemes are administered by the Council:

1. General Cultural Scholarship Scheme (GCSS)

General Cultural Scholarships are offered for undergraduate, post-graduate and doctoral studies in all disciplines except medicine.

2. Cultural Exchange Programme (CEP) Scholarship

CEP Scholarships are offered for undergraduate, post-graduate and doctoral studies in various fields to foreign scholars in accordance with the CEP signed between the Government of India and the country concerned.

3. Commonwealth Scholarship

Commonwealth Scholarships were instituted for human resource development for the nationals of Commonwealth countries.

4. Bangladesh Scholarship

A 100 special scholarship slots are offered to the nationals of Bangladesh to pursue courses in the fields of arts and science, along with specialized courses in engineering, pharmacy and agriculture, sports, performing and visual arts.

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5. Mauritius Scholarship

Under this scheme, 30 scholarships are offered to students from Mauritius to pursue undergraduate and post-graduate courses.

6. Sri Lanka Scholarship

Under this scheme, 47 scholarships are offered to Sri Lankan students to pursue undergraduate and post-graduate courses.

7. ICCR Scholarship

ICCR Scholarships are meant for foreign students interested in learning Indian music, dance, painting, sculptures, etc. These scholarships are valid for one year. The scholars are attached with various universities/institutions and Gurus. At present this scheme offers 100 slots.

8. Reciprocal Scholarship

Eight scholarships are offered to students from Latin America and 17 scholarships are offered to students from Europe, bi-annually.

9. Africa Day Scholarship

A special scholarship scheme to mark 'Africa Day' was instituted in the memory of Late Dr. Amilcar Cabral. Under this scheme, the scholarship is offered to a national of one African country on a rotatory basis to pursue undergraduate, post-graduate, doctoral and postdoctoral studies.

10. Dadoo Naicker Scholarship

The Dadoo Naicker Scholarship was instituted in the memory of Mr. Yusuf Dadoo and Mr. Monty Naicker of the South African Indian Congress. It is awarded to a South African student of Indian origin for post-graduate studies.

11. Aneurin Bevan Scholarship

In 1964, a scholarship was instituted by the Government of India in memory of British Parliamentarian, Aneurin Bevan. It is awarded annually to a British national for study in the

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fields of humanities, science, medicine and nursing. The selection of the fellow is done by the Aneurin Bevan Trust in consultation with the High Commission of India, London. The scholarship is tenable for a period upto 3 months from the date of arrival in India.

12. Okita Memorial Scholarship

The Okita Memorial Scholarship has been instituted in the memory of late Dr. S. Okita, recipient of the Indira Gandhi Prize for peace, disarmament and development. It is offered to a meritorious Indian student to study India-Japan Relations and is tenable for a period of two years of post-graduate degree at the Jawaharlal Nehru University.

13. Craft Instructor Scholarship

Ten scholarships are offered annually to nationals of Commonwealth countries for a one year training course as craft instructors in the areas of carpentry and welding.

Apart from the above, the Council implements the following scholarship schemes as agency work on behalf of the Ministry of External Affairs and Ministry of Finance:

1. Technical Cooperation Scheme of the Colombo Plan

The Department of Economic Affairs, Ministry of Finance and the Northern Division of Ministry of External Affairs fund these scholarships.

2. Aid to Maldives

This scheme was initiated during the academic year 2002-03 with 10 scholarship slots for the nationals of Maldives.

3. Silver Jubilee Scholarship Scheme

Under this scholarship scheme, 25 scholarship slots are offered to the nationals of Nepal for engineering courses.

4. SAARC Chair/Scholarship/Fellowship Scheme

In order to develop close relations and intensify the interaction between scholars in the SAARC region, 6 fellowships and 12 scholarships are offered to the SAARC member states annually.

A SAARC Chair has been set up in an Indian University. It is offered on a rotatory basis each year. The objective of this Chair is to attract scholars of excellence and repute.

5. Aid Nepal Scholarship Scheme

The number of scholarships varies from 50 to 60 every year, for undergraduate, postgraduate and doctoral studies in any discipline except medicine.

The Council continued to accord importance and priority to the general welfare of the foreign students. The following steps were taken in this direction:

- a Winter and summer camps continued to be very popular with the foreign students. The camps exposed the foreign students to different facets of Indian culture and society. During the year, five winter camps and three summer camps were organized. The cities covered were Cochin/ Alleppey/Thiruvanananthapuram/Kanyakumari, Chennai/Pondicherry/ Tanjore/ Madurai/ Thiruvanananthapuram, Shimla/Kulu-Manali, Nainital/Ranikhet/Almora, Gwalior/Orchha/Khajuraho/ Bandhav-Garh National Park-Shivpuri, Jaipur,/Bikaner/Jodhpur/ Udaipur/Chittorgarh/Ajmer, Mumbai/Pune/ Aurangabad and Puri/Bhubaneshwar. Two hundred and eighty-seven ICCR scholars and non-ICCR scholars attended these camps.
- b International Students Day is celebrated annually in the memory of Maulana Abul Kalam Azad, the founder President of the Council. The 12th International Students Day was observed on 7 December, 2004. Students from 20 countries gave a colourful cultural performance on the occasion.
- c Claims of foreign students regarding medical treatment, accommodation, thesis charges, etc. were promptly settled. Private accommodations were arranged for students who were not able to get hostel accommodation.

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d Foreign Students Advisors (FSAs) were designated in different universities to help foreign students adjust to life in India. They were paid a sumptuary allowance to defray the expenses towards social get-togethers that were organized for the foreign scholars.

Orientation Course for Indian Foreign Service (IFS) Probationers

The Council organized a one-week Orientation Course from 28th September to 1st October, 2004 for the IFS probationers of 2003 batch to expose them to India's rich cultural diversity. Twelve IFS probationers participated.

The Council also organized an Orientation Programme for IFS probationers of 2004 batch from 14th to 22nd March, 2005. Sixteen IFS probationers participated.

ii) Indian Cultural Centres Abroad

In order to project India's composite cultural heritage abroad, the Council maintained the following 17 Indian Cultural Centres (and 2 sub-centres) :

- 2. Paramaribo (Suriname)
- 3. Port Louis (Mauritius)
- 4. Jakarta and sub-centre at Bali (Indonesia)

- 16. Kuala Lumpur (Malaysia)
- 17. Suva and sub-centre at Lautoka (Fiji)

The following activities were undertaken by these cultural centres:

- Performances by visiting performing artistes from India;
- b) Performances of Indian dance and music by the local talent;
- c) Classes in Indian dance and music, Hindi and Yoga. The classes were conducted by teachers deputed by the Council and, where necessary, by hiring local teachers. Twenty India-based teachers and 3 local teachers are currently deputed to these centres.

- d) Exhibitions;
- Lectures by visiting scholars and experts from India;

- f) Inviting scholars, opinion-makers, academics and other important personalities from India;
- g) Seminars/Conferences, with local participation of academics, journalists, professors and opinion-makers;
- Presentation of musical instruments, books on India and audio-visual material to important personalities and universities/institutions;
- Special programmes organized on occasions of major festivals like Deepawali, Holi, Id, Shivratri, etc.;
- j) Encourage various schools and institutions to organize performances by visiting Indian and local artistes;
- k) Retrospective of Indian films;
- A well-stocked library and audio-video archives to provide facilities of reading and lending of books by leading exponents of Indian literature, culture, history, dance and music;
- Facilitate foreign students to seek admission into Indian universities and to avail of scholarships offered by GOI.

iii) Visiting Professors and Chairs of Indian Studies Abroad

In order to encourage studies on India, the Council maintained 19 Chairs abroad. Out of these, 15 were occupied and 4 went vacant. The details are as follows:

- a) Nine Chairs of Hindi at Madrid (Spain), Sofia (Bulgaria), Brussels (Belgium), Budapest (Hungary), Seoul (South Korea), Warsaw (Poland), Ankara (Turkey), Bucharest (Romania) and Beijing (China). One Chair is vacant at Moscow (Russia). Two Chairs of Propagation of Hindi at Paramaribo (Suriname) and Port of Spain (Trinidad & Tobago) (an Agency work on behalf of Kendriya Hindi Sansthan, Agra).
- b) One Chair of Sanskrit at Bangkok (Thailand). One Chair of Sanskrit is vacant at Paris (France).

- c) One Chair of Modern Indian History & Civilizations at Osh (Kyrghystan). One Chair of Modern Indian History & South Asian Affairs is vacant at Port of Spain (Trinidad & Tobago).
- d) One Chair of Tamil at Warsaw (Poland);
- e) One Chair of International Relations, Diplomacy and International Law at Tashkent (Uzbekistan) and;
- f) One Chair of Contemporary Indian Studies is vacant at Moka (Mauritius).

iv) Creative Dialogue Section

This section was responsible for organizing/sponsoring seminars and interactions with intellectuals, opinion-makers and academics. It examines the requests received from various universities/ NGOs for financial support to organize such events. During the year the Council organized/and assisted 6 seminars: 'India's Cultural Diplomacy in South East Asia', by Society of Indian Ocean Studies, Hyderabad; 'Revisioning Mumbai' by Asiatic Society of Mumbai; 'Anton Pariovich Chekov' by M.S. University, Baroda; 'Youth for Human Unity' by Auroville Foundation, Pondicherry; 'Indian Diaspora' by Hyderabad University, and 'Poet Sheikh Ali Hazeen' by BHU, Varanasi.

The following activities were also managed by the section:

1. Jawaharlal Nehru Award for International Understanding

The Jawaharlal Nehru Award for International Understanding 2003 was conferred on Mr. Goh Chok Tong, Hon'ble Prime Minister of Singapore, at a special ceremony held at Ashoka Hall, Rashtrapati Bhavan on 9th July, 2004.

2. Maulana Abul Kalam Azad Memorial Lecture

Lord Meghnad Desai, renowned Economist, delivered the 36 Maulana Abul Kalam Azad Memorial Lecture on 14 December, 2004. The theme of his address was 'Globalization and Culture'.

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3. Maulana Abul Kalam Azad Essay Competition

The Competition was instituted in the memory of the Council's Founder President Maulana Abul Kalam Azad. Citizens from all countries are now eligible to send entries in Arabic, Hindi and Urdu languages. Entries in English are open to participants from India and SAARC countries only.

Hon'ble Vice-President of India, Shri Bhairon Singh Shekhawat, presented the awards to the winners of the Maulana Abul Kalam Azad Essay Competition held in 2002. A function was organized on 4th September, 2004 for the distribution of awards.

v) Performing Arts

Outgoing Cultural Groups

The Council sponsored 73 groups to present varied forms of Indian dance and music abroad. These included classical, contemporary, tribal and folk art forms. Priority was accorded to participation in major cultural festivals so as to get the maximum exposure. In some of the countries the visiting Indian artists gave lecture-demonstrations for the benefit of local talent.

Audio-Visual Recording Unit

The Council had organized an Empanelment Advisory Committee Meeting held on 28th May, 2004 and the committee approved the recommendations of sub-committee and selected 225 artistes in different categories for inclusion in the ICCR reference list.

President, ICCR and DG, ICCR had approved the proposal of digitalization of ICCR (AVR) archives. Three hundred and fifty-three videocassettes were converted into VCD/CDs. A one-minute opening montage about the activities of ICCR has been inserted in the VCDs.

An updated reference list of empanelled artistes with ICCR since 1989 to 2004 is ready.

The Council further received 250 new applications for empanelment.

Incoming Cultural Groups

The Council hosted 16 groups of performing artistes from abroad. The performances were held in several cities of the country, viz. Delhi, Bangalore, Bhopal, Chennai, Chandigarh, Goa, Hyderabad, Haridwar, Kolkata, Lucknow, Mumbai, Trivandrum, Udaipur, etc.

Indian Cultural Performances

The Council organized the performances of the artistes empanelled with it under its 'Retrospective' and 'Horizon' series. The Retrospective series is meant for artistes who have already been sponsored abroad for performances and the Horizon series is meant for those artistes who are yet to be sponsored. Besides, the Council also organized special events, for instance, Summer Dance and Music Festival, Indo-Egyptian Music Concert, Malhar Festival, Kaleidoscope, Sufi Festival, Festival of Indian Classical Dance & Music by Resident Foreign Artistes, the New Delhi International Cultural Festival and the Kashmir Festival.

Foreign Cultural Centres

The Council continued to administer the British Council Libraries and coordinate the activities of the Foreign Cultural Centres in India.

vi) Distinguished Visitors Programme

The Distinguished Visitors Programme continues to remain one of the important functions of the Council. Under this programme, the Council invites writers, scholars, intellectuals, opinion-makers, academics, artistes, etc., from overseas to expose them to various facets of Indian life and society. The distinguished visitors found this programme extremely useful and expressed their desire to visit India again.

The Council sponsored the visit of intellectuals and other eminent persons to speak on themes and issues that the Council wishes to project abroad. The Council also sponsored experts' participation in international seminars on themes that are relevant to ICCR's mandate and activities. During the year the Council hosted the visit of 57 incoming visitors from 28 countries to India and sponsored 58 Indian visitors to 48 countries.

Details of Incoming Visitors are given in Appendix vii.

Details of Outgoing Visitors are given in Appendix viii.

Orientation Grants

This grant was provided to overseas scholars for a 3-month duration to enable them to pursue research and higher studies in their chosen field. Four Orientation Grants were provided to scholars from Suriname, 2 from Bangladesh, 2 from Sri Lanka, 2 from Germany and 1 from Poland.

vii) Publications

The Council published the following six quarterly journals:

Articles by Indian and foreign scholars were included in the journals. These journals were widely circulated in the countries concerned. They are also important vehicles in projecting the Indian viewpoint to readers abroad.

During the year the Council also published the following:

- 2. Sufism in Arabic in Arabic
- 3. Situation of Arabic Language in the Indian Universities in Arabic
- 4. Biography of Maulana Azad in Arabic
- 5. 'Globalization and Culture', Maulana Azad Memorial Lecture by Lord Meghnad Desai.

The Council also participated in the 10th Delhi Book Fair from 21st to 29th August, 2004 and in the Book Exhibition at Karnal, Haryana on Gandhi Jayanti.

viii) Exhibitions

The Council sponsored 7 exhibitions to 18 countries. The themes of these exhibitions and the countries where they were held are as follows:

- 1. Exhibition entitled 'My land and My People': Seychelles, Zimbabwe, Namibia, Suriname, Venezuela, and for permanent display at ICC, Guyana.
- 2. Madhubani Painting Exhibition: Port of Spain.
- Indian Dolls & Dresses Exhibition: Yugoslavia, Slovak Republic, Romania and Czech Republic.
- Exhibition entitled 'Celebrating Women Amrita Shergil Revisited': Uzbekistan, Kyrghyzstan, Kazakhstan, Mongolia and Moscow.

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- 5. 'Murals of India': Nehru Centre, London.
- 6. Exhibition on 'Contemporary Graphic Prints': Poland, Argentina and Brazil.

The Council also sent 12 oil-on-canvas paintings depicting folk and theatre forms of India for permanent display at Nehru Centre, London.

Besides these, the Council hosted the following foreign exhibitions in Delhi:

- 1. 'Posters and Symbols': from Slovak Republic.
- 2. 'Painting and Craft Fair': from Kyrghyzstan.
- 3. 'Sculpture': from Romania.

During the year, busts and statues of national leaders were sent abroad for permanent installation. The details are as follows:

- 1. Bust of Mahatma Gandhi to Buenos Aires and Paris.
- 2. Bust of Rajiv Gandhi to Port Louis.
- 3. Statue of Mother Teresa to Chicago.

ix) Presentation

The Council sent books, audio-visual material, art objects and musical instruments, etc., highlighting Indian culture, art, architecture, cuisine, dance and music, for presentation to 34 countries.

Details are given in Appendix x.

x) Library

The Council's Library maintains a wide collection of nearly 50,000 titles on Indian history, art, culture and cotemporary issues. The library also houses a collection of 195 rare manuscripts by

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Maulana Azad in Urdu, Arabic and Persian languages. The manuscripts and other rare books, along with microfilm rolls are housed in a special section of the library called 'Gosha-e-Azad'.

About 4,237 visitors visited the library during this year. The library has also added 600 books to its collections.

The library awarded 5 short-term Library Fellowships to Indian nationals.

Details are given in Appendix xi.

The Library has also started the process of Retro-conversion and Bar-coding of language books in Urdu, Arabic and Persian. The C-DAC digitized all manuscripts and is now in the process of digitizing the rare books of Maulana Azad's personal collection.

The library is a member of DELNET (Developing Library Network) to facilitate inter-library networking in Delhi.

xi) Administration

The list of Statutory Bodies of the Council is given in Appendix xii to xiv.

The Council observed the 116th Birth Anniversary and 47th Death Anniversary of Maulana Abul Kalam Azad on 11 November, 2004 and on 22 February, 2005 respectively, at his Mazaar Sharif near Jama Masjid in Delhi.

The Regional Offices continued to function in Bangalore, Chandigarh, Chennai, Hyderabad, Kolkata, Lucknow, Mumbai and Thiruvananthapuram, including the newly opened office in Jaipur. The activities of the regional offices consisted of coordination with local bodies/organization and assistance to foreign students studying under Council's scholarship schemes within their areas of operation. The regional offices also extend logistic facilities to incoming and outgoing cultural delegations, distinguished visitors, and any other work assigned to them by Headquarters.

xii) Accounts

The Council received Rs. 5,750 lakhs as Grant-in-Aid from the Ministry of External Affairs for the year 2004-2005 and Rs. 88.74 lakhs as receipts from other sources. The actual expenditure during the year 2004-05 was Rs. 5,817.09 lakhs. The head-wise expenditure is as given below:

ICC&C Section

ICC&C Section controls the administration/functioning of the Indian Cultural Centres and Chairs of Indian Studies abroad, which includes the selection of India-based teachers/professors and directors, their deployment, and settlement of their dues. The activities of these centres are monitored through monthly activities reports and discussions with Heads of the Mission by the DG/DDGs from time to time. The country-wise locations of the Cultural Centres and Chairs abroad alongwith brief activities carried out by them are as given below:

1. Indian Cultural Centres Abroad

In order to promote awareness and appreciation of India's composite cultural heritage abroad, the Council is currently maintaining 17 Cultural Centres in Cairo (Egypt), Berlin (Germany), Port Louis (Mauritius), Paramaribo (Suriname), Georgetown (Guyana), Jakarta (Indonesia), Moscow (Russian Federation), London (UK), Almaty (Kazakhstan), Tashkent (Uzbekistan), Durban and Johannesburg (South Africa), Port of Spain (Trinidad and Tobago), Colombo (Sri Lanka), Dushanbe (Tajikistan), Kuala Lumpur (Malaysia), Suva (Fiji) and 2 sub-centres at Bali (Indonesia) and Lautoka (Fiji). All of them are functioning under the administrative control of their respective Indian Missions abroad. The Council is also funding a Music and Dance Academy at Dhaka (Bangladesh).

2. Visiting Professors & Chairs of Indian Studies Abroad

The Council maintains Chairs of Indian Studies abroad to teach Indian languages and other related subjects under the Bilateral Cultural Exchange Programmes, a scheme of Propagation of Hindi abroad and the Council's own programme. Currently 19 chairs are being maintained for teaching Hindi, Sanskrit, Tamil, Modern Indian History and Indian Civilization in Paramaribo (Suriname) Budapest (Hungary), Moscow (Russia), Seoul (South Korea), Warsaw (Poland — 2 posts Hindi and Tamil), Port of Spain (Trinidad and Tobago — 2 posts Hindi and Modern Indian History/South Asian Affairs), Ankara (Turkey), Sofia (Bulgaria), Bucharest (Romania), Beijing (China), Madrid (Spain), Bangkok (Thailand), Paris (France), Osh (Kyrghystan), Tashkent (Uzbekistan), Brussels (Belgium) and Moka (Mauritius).

The activities of the Cultural Centres reflect the needs of the local population. The Centres organize talks, lectures, exhibitions of visual arts, essay competitions, performances of dance and music, staging of plays, screening of Indian films, publication of news bulletins, seminars on Indian topics, etc. Some of the cultural centres also have regular teaching classes of Indian music, dance, tabla and yoga. The centres also maintain libraries, reading rooms and audio-video libraries for the visitors. Apart from organizing their own activities, these cultural centres also provide a supportive role to the respective Indian Missions for coordinating various cultural activities. The centres develop and maintain contacts with the local citizens, particularly students, teachers, academics, opinion-makers and cultural personalities to project a holistic picture of India's rich and diverse cultural heritage.

Report of Activity (Special Project)

Completion of Work Establishing 5 (Five) Kiosks at Seim Reap, Cambodia

The Minimally Invasive Education (MIE) Kiosks Project for implanting literacy and education among the weakest section of the society in Cambodia was finally completed and made operational during late 2004.

The then Honorable Prime Minister of India, during his visit to Cambodia in April 2002, had promised that the Government of India will help the Cambodian Government to set up Internet kiosks for the benefit of the Cambodian people. MIE Kiosks consist of one or more computers connected to the Internet and are housed in specifically designed rugged structures. These kiosks can withstand the local environmental conditions and rough usage by the general public.

The kiosks were established and became functional at five different locations at Cambodia. These locations are:

- i) Mukh Neak Primary School, Siem Reap
- ii) Hun Sen Sreypeap High School, Kandal
- iii) Reach Bo Primary School, Siem Reap
- iv) Chea Sim High School, Takeo
- v) Park Joint Norodom Blvd. and Road Nos. 108/106, near the Mahatma Gandhi Statue, Phnom Penh
